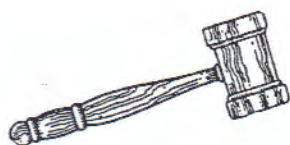

GENEALOGY FINDS IN A BIBLE

Friedrich Alexander Sperling, from Hahausen, Germany, brought his wife Johanna Maria Sophia Elizabeth (Hofmeister) Sperling, and children John Christian, Charles, Wilhelm, Caroline and Memo Augusta (born on ship) to the United States in 1841. After entering through the port of New Orleans, they traveled the Mississippi River and traveled by wagon to the area of Tilsit-Burfordville, Missouri. Here they began buying land and farmed. They became active members of St. James United Church of Christ located on County Road 366, Jackson, MO.

On 25 August 1853, John Christian Sperling married Maria Barbara Welsch, "the legitimate daughter of Andreas Welsch, a farmer, from Meisenheim, Baden". The large German Bible records the events of Christian and Barbara's children's birth and deaths, Barbara's death, the second marriage as well as children born during his second marriage.

The German translation of his handwriting reads as follows:

Page 1 We were married
 the 25 August in the year 1853
 Christian Sperling and Barbara Welsch

 Christian Sperling and Philemenia
 Sperling were married
 the 5th of June in the year 1866

Page 2 Carolina is born the 2 August 1854
 Augusta is born the 21 December in the year 1856
 A son is born again December in the year 1858
 J. R. Minna is born the 3 December in the year 1860
 My wife is born the 17 January 1843 [second wife]

Page 3 Carolina died the 17 December in the year 1855
 Augusta died the 19 September in the year 1857
 My son died the 5 December 1858
 My wife is buried the 24th of October in the year 1865 [first wife]
 H. F. Herman died 5 April in the year 1873 [son from second marriage]

Page 4 Frank is born the 16 February in the year 1867
 Johanna Dorette is born the 17 January in the year 1869
 Christian Herman is born the 28 December 1875
 Anna is born the 30 August 1880

Much of the recorded information would have been lost if John Christian Sperling had not recorded the information in the family Bible passed down through the years. It is believed that the children from the first marriage are buried at St. James Cemetery. Barbara's funeral was held in Trinity Lutheran Church-Cape Girardeau and assumed to be buried at St. James Cemetery-Tilsit, Missouri.

As we paged through the Bible, we found a beautifully decorated poem written by Barbara Sperling to her husband as he served in the Civil War. The poem is in beautiful German script! Christian Sperling helped build the

*I think of you every morning
Under desire, worry, cares!
Of you I ask every moment
God who protects you even in misfortune
That you victorious return to me,
Do not forget me!*

W. H. MILLER IS TAKEN SUDDENLY; FUNERAL TUESDAY

EMINENT ATTORNEY'S TAKING OFF BRINGS SORROW TO COMMUNITY

Although expected for several months, the announcement Sunday morning that William Henry Miller had suddenly been called created a pang of sincere sorrow to permeate to every corner of the city instantly and to all parts of the district and state. "Bill" Miller, as he was affectionately known to hundreds of old friends, was a man whose absence for all time was bound to cast a shadow over the Easter Sunday observances and to bring regret from the bottom of every heart.

His hold on the people's confidence and friendship was probably unequalled in this community. His character was lovable in the extreme. He was the sympathetic friend to listen to any woe and his heart was so big as to encompass the trouble of the afflicted in every degree of society. Those whom he had assisted in one way or another could be counted by the score and with the unconscious appreciation of his many whole-souled traits by those who had never found occasion to lean upon him for financial or legal aid but merely knew him as a friend he bore a reputation statewide and uneffacing when death comes to take him away.

Mr. Miller was seated at the breakfast table Sunday morning at 8:30 o'clock when the final stroke occurred to carry him off. The end came suddenly and unexpectedly and was painless. It is a source of satisfaction to his friends that his death was peaceful and calm, as his life was invariably.

For two or three days he had been feeling unusually well and to friends had expressed the hope that he would soon be able to get out of the house again and visit his office. Indeed he was so well and strong as to lend hope that his desires might be fulfilled. But his period of strength was merely the precursor of the end, as it usually proves to be in cases of such affliction.

It was in February 1912, two or three days before his aged father passed away at the old homestead in the west part of the county, that Mr. Miller suffered the first stroke of apoplexy. Although the first warning of the impending affliction it was severe enough to denote that the break in his life had come. He remained at home for sometime recuperating and then resumed his visits to his office. One arm was rendered limp and useless by the stroke and treatments for relief brought little relief. He was taken to Texas and other places to receive the benefits of change in air and climate but they brought only temporary relief. He returned home a year ago and resumed his business affairs for long periods unbroken and was at his desk nearly daily until two months ago when a second stroke sent him to bed and confined him to his home until the final stroke occurred Sunday.

Mr. Miller was born September 28, 1856, on the old homestead of the family a mile south of Millersville. His parents were Rev. and Mrs. Andrew Miller, descendants of a Dutch family that emigrated to the territory from North Carolina at the beginning of the nineteenth century. He was one of three sons and a daughter born to Rev. Miller's union with Sophia Miller, the others being J. W. Miller, who died in 1906, E. S. Miller, who survives, and Elizabeth E. Miller, who died in 1873 after marrying Thomas Bast. Rev. Miller for his second wife took Sarah Hutson, by whom he had one daughter, Mrs. Hattie Hendricks of Devall's Bluff, Ark., and a son, R. M. Miller of Millersville.

Mr. Miller came by his fine traits and manhood naturally. The original John Miller and his wife and family were of good Dutch stock that had settled in North Carolina. They emigrated to the present site of Millersville in 1802, having been granted a tract of 640 acres of land by the Spanish government for themselves and 320 acres for

each of their twelve children. One of the sons was Henry Miller, W. H. Miller's grandfather. It fell to his lot to participate in the Indian wars which resulted in the pacification of this territory later. Henry Miller had ten children, one of whom was Rev. Andrew Miller, a Universalist preacher, who lived to a ripe old age and died only in 1912, February 14.

The large families of the forbearers of the present generations are responsible for the numerous Millers still living in the community and emigrated to other places far and near.

W. H. Miller was brought up on the old farm and sent to school at Millersville until 17 years of age. He then went to the Normal school for two or three years and taught a year or two afterwards. He then decided upon the law profession and set out for Columbia to attend the state university law school. He graduated there and returned to Jackson to practice. His open-hearted sympathy for the unfortunate soon won him a large and lucrative practice. He married Miss Elizabeth Welling and his success as a lawyer, a banker, and a prominent citizen was assured.

Once or twice he stood for public office but the peculiarities of politics overcame his tremendous popularity and prevented his selection to any office. Later when larger honors were clearly within his grasp he refused to consider them but remained devoted to his private business and interests, made a huge success, and built up a fortune. He served for several years as attorney for a railroad corporation and only once accepted an appointive position that of member of the state board of law examiners. Six years ago Mr. Miller caused the organization of the Southeast Missouri Trust company in the city and was made its first president, a position he held to his death.

He moved to this city from Jackson when elected to the place. He purchased the large residence property and house at the corner of Fountain and Independence streets from Mrs. Jennie Crowder and resided there. Besides his widow he is survived by an only son, Julien G. Miller.

The funeral will be held Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock at the house. A few weeks ago Mr. Miller united with the Presbyterian church and the services of that church will be pronounced at the funeral. Interment will be at the family lot in Jackson. It is thought that a large number of prominent men from St. Louis and other points will be present.

WM. H. MILLER IS FOUND DEAD

STRIKEN WITH HEART DIS-
EASE SON AFTER START-
ING WORK IN EVENING

LAY IN CAR ALL NIGHT

Lived at Brick House North of Pow-
er Plant, Where He had Con-
tract for Unload-
ing Coal

William Henry Miller was found dead this morning at 5:30 o'clock by Fate Young in a coal car at the tower house in the north end of the city. He had fallen over dead from heart disease some time early in the evening of Wednesday.

Miller came to Cape Girardeau from the Gravel Hill neighborhood in the far west end of the county in September, 1908, and was one of the numerous Millers of that community. He brought his family with him and they lived in the brick house just north of the power plant.

He had a contract with Young to upload coal for the Missouri Public Utilities Company and was going about his work when seized with an attack. His body was found stretched out in the bottom of the car and apparently he had died without a struggle.

Was Happy at Supper

He had been subject to pains over the heart and only the previous night had been compelled to rise from his bed and walk about. Mrs. Miller said today that he held his hand over his heart then and complained of the pain and also pains from rheumatism. He had never been troubled seriously, however, and his death from that cause surprised the members of his family.

He had eaten supper with Mrs. Miller, his three sons, and two daughters about 5:30 o'clock Wednesday evening. He was cheerful and talked and laughed with the others. When he arose from the table he said he would go over to the power plant and work a little. He went out and the members of the family thought he would return as usual about the time the curfew whistle blew at 8:15 o'clock. The whistle was his quitting time when he worked after supper.

Miller did not return to the house then, but nothing strange was thought about it, as he frequently has worked until late at night to unload coal and sometimes had been called into the plant to work in the place of some employee off duty.

Later in the evening a son, Robert, walked by the car where the father lay dead, but had no idea that his father was there. The employees of the plant were around the place frequently, but had no reason to look into the car.

Not until Young, who had the contract with Miller, appeared in the morning was the body discovered. He notified the family and the coroner, Dr. E. R. Schoen, of Gordonville, who drove to the city later in the morning and held an inquest. The jury found that Miller had been stricken with heart disease, but the coroner makes an affidavit giving cerebral apoplexy as the cause for particularity demanded by the laws.

The jury was composed of O. L. Childs, foreman; O. C. Martin, William Hawkins, J. W. Copeland, Oscar Marlin, and H. Meyer.

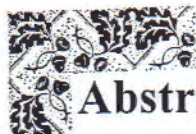
Miller is survived by the widow and three sons, Ervin, Veatrice, and Robert, and four daughters, Mrs. Sedalia Newell, Mrs. Hesther Wheeler and Miss Ola and Mrs. Edna Loveland of Portland, Oregon. There are three brothers, Alonzo of Idaho, John of Buffalo, and Manford of Kansas City; two halfbrothers, Vitalis of British Columbia and Marcellus of Colorado. One brother, Elhannon, a detective, disappeared in the west nearly twenty years ago and was never heard from. A half sister, Mrs. Kirksey, lives in California.

Miller was born in the west end of the county, his father having the same name. He was 56 years of age December 13.

It was thought today that funeral services would be held Saturday. Messages were sent to his brothers and word was waited from them before a definite announcement would be made.

ξ FINDING FEMALES ξ

How easy it is to lose our female ancestors! They marry and change names, and, if they are in a country whose legal system comes from English Common Law, they disappear if we don't know those married names. However, legal systems that derive from civil law, such as those in France, Spain, the province of Quebec, and the state of Louisiana, retain different traditions. In these places, a woman's name remains the one she was born with, and if she wants to adopt another, for instance her husband's surname, she may have to go through a formal legal proceeding to do so. When searching for your female ancestors, be sure to check both married and maiden names. When looking through passenger ship lists, especially for you Italian, Dutch, and French female ancestors, search under their maiden names. They may be listed that way even though they were married at that time. A book you may want to add to your library is Sharon DeBartolo Carmack's *A Genealogist's Guide to Discovering Your Female Ancestors*, Betterway Books, 1998. She leaves three daughters, Mrs. Mary RITTER, Mrs. Henry PUCHBAUER, and Mrs. Gustav LUDWIG. Buried in City Cemetery.

Mrs. Wilhelmine BINGENHEIMER, age 82, died Saturday at her daughter's, Mrs. August KASTEN; nee DICKMAN. Born in Germany 11 May 1883, married Phillip BINGENHEIMER. Children: William, Mrs. John SCHAEFER, Mrs. R. C. KASTEN, Mrs. Louis SCHLOSS, and Mrs. Martin SCHLOSS. Buried near Arnsburg.

Mrs. Lavina MARTIN dies; wife of George W.; married 1868. She leaves her husband; two daughters, Laura COWAN and Roxanna WILSON; and sons Walter, Theo, Lawrence, and Dennes. Buried at Old Appleton.

John Thompson was born about 1751/1752 and died in Missouri in 1818. He married Mary Jeffers. They moved from Union County, South Carolina, to Christian County, Kentucky about 1797, and to Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, about 1808. Their children were (1) John Jr. (1771/1780-1833 Cape Girardeau County, Missouri), married Jane Goodin Strong; (2) James (1776-1852 Cape Girardeau County, Missouri), married Frances Johnson Strong; (3) Margaret "Peggy" (1781/1790-1835 Memphis, Shelby County, Tennessee), married Samuel Godwin Dunn; (4) Mary "Polly" (1787-1858 Howard County, Missouri), married Uriah Williams; (5) Sarah A. "Sally" (1789-1835 Cape Girardeau County, Missouri), married John Rogers Clark; (6) Narcissa (1790/1794-c1824 Cape Girardeau County, Missouri); (7) Nero Morgan (1794-1866 Howard County, Missouri), married Sarah Elizabeth Williams; and (8) Elizabeth "Betsy" (c1799-1886 Bienville Parish, Louisiana), married Berry A. Wilson. After Mary's death in 1815, John married Sarah, widow of Edward A. Spear Jr. John and Sarah had a daughter, Elvira Caroline (c1816-c1855 DeSoto, Jefferson County, Missouri), m. Samuel Thomas McGee.

The author details much of the history of the older generations, from documents recorded in Missouri and Kentucky and beyond. Descendants are brought down to the current generation, and have spread to nearly every state and a few foreign countries.

The Cape Girardeau County Archive proudly presents its newest publication: a 382-page book containing 9,043 abstracts of volumes B-G (there is no volume A) of County Court record books. The abstracts were done by Catherine Stoverink and Bob & Ann Parkinson. Transcripts of volumes C-F were made possible by a grant provided by the office of the Secretary of State, State of Missouri, Local Records Program. The book contains 28 three column pages of the every name index as well as an action index to facilitate research in the records. The abstracts give the reader insight into everyday life and legal matters from 1821-1854 at the county government level. Topics included are accounts due, appointments to county jobs, apprenticeships/indentures, wolf bounty, census, courthouse and jail maintenance, emancipations, estate proceedings, guardianships, inquests, naturalizations, elections, licenses awarded, bridges, courthouse, ferry rates, Negroes, Revolutionary War pension applications, roads, canals, schools, establishments of townships, taxes, and welfare. One interesting tidbit concerns the relocation of the County Seat on May 30, 1833. Seven hundred fifty-four citizens petitioned the court for removal of the County Seat from Jackson to Cape Girardeau. The petition was granted by the Court and five citizens from Scott County were chosen to "select a suitable site whereon to locate the seat of justice of this County at or within one mile of the town of Cape Girardeau." The Commissioners were to report on July 18, 1833. Sept 23, 1833, the Commissioners presented their report which was "ordered to be filed with consideration of the same continued to the next term of this Court." That is the last that is heard of the idea through 1854. Things haven't changed a whole lot in 150 years. The Cape Girardeau County Commission is still dealing with many of the same types of issues.

The book was made possible through a grant from the Secretary of State, Local Records Grant program and the translation work of Larry Havelock Jackson, M.A. in French, Middlebury College, Vermont, with a year of graduate studies at the Sorbonne in Paris, France, and twenty plus years experience as a free lance interpreter at the United Nations in Vienna, Austria, and the European Union (EC) in Brussels, Belgium. Mr. Jackson was also Assistant Professor of French at the United States

Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colorado. He currently makes his home in Cape Girardeau, Missouri. Mr. Jackson was assisted by his wife, Mrs. Jane Randol Jackson, Director of the Cape Girardeau County Archive Center who has her M.A. in French, Middlebury College, Vermont, with a year of graduate studies at Nanterre University in Paris, France, and 20 years teaching French in Cape Girardeau, Missouri and Vienna Austria. The handwriting is sometimes illegible with omitted words. Many documents are separate pieces of paper in the distinctive French handwriting of Barthelemi Cousin, secretary to Louis Lorimier, Commandant of the Post of Cape Girardeau. The first section of French Documents marked I A, B, C through 12 A, B, C are found in the Archive Collection entitled "Papers from the Spanish Regime and the Court of Don Louis Lorimier" Box 42 and are located in Files 21-32. The 16 page grouping of documents is found in one book from the court records entitled *Cape Girardeau Court of Common Pleas, Writ of Capias No. B, Satisfactions and Book of Wills 1806-1807*. These pages contain the probate information for Elijah Everrets or Averett, Richard Williamson, and Samuel Randol, son of Enos Randol, as well as Indentures for Children—Nancy and Salley Worth, daughters of Lewis Worth to Mr. William Boner. 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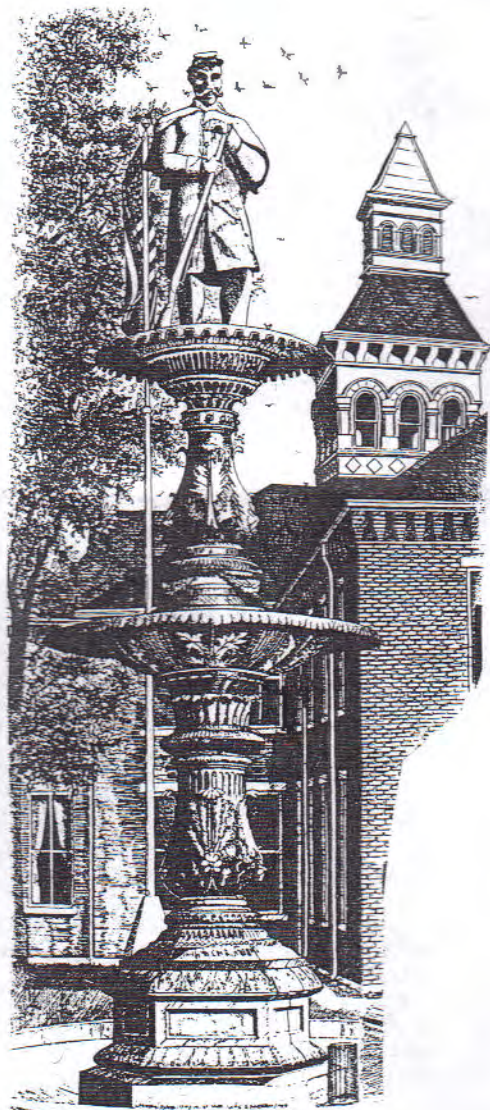
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
