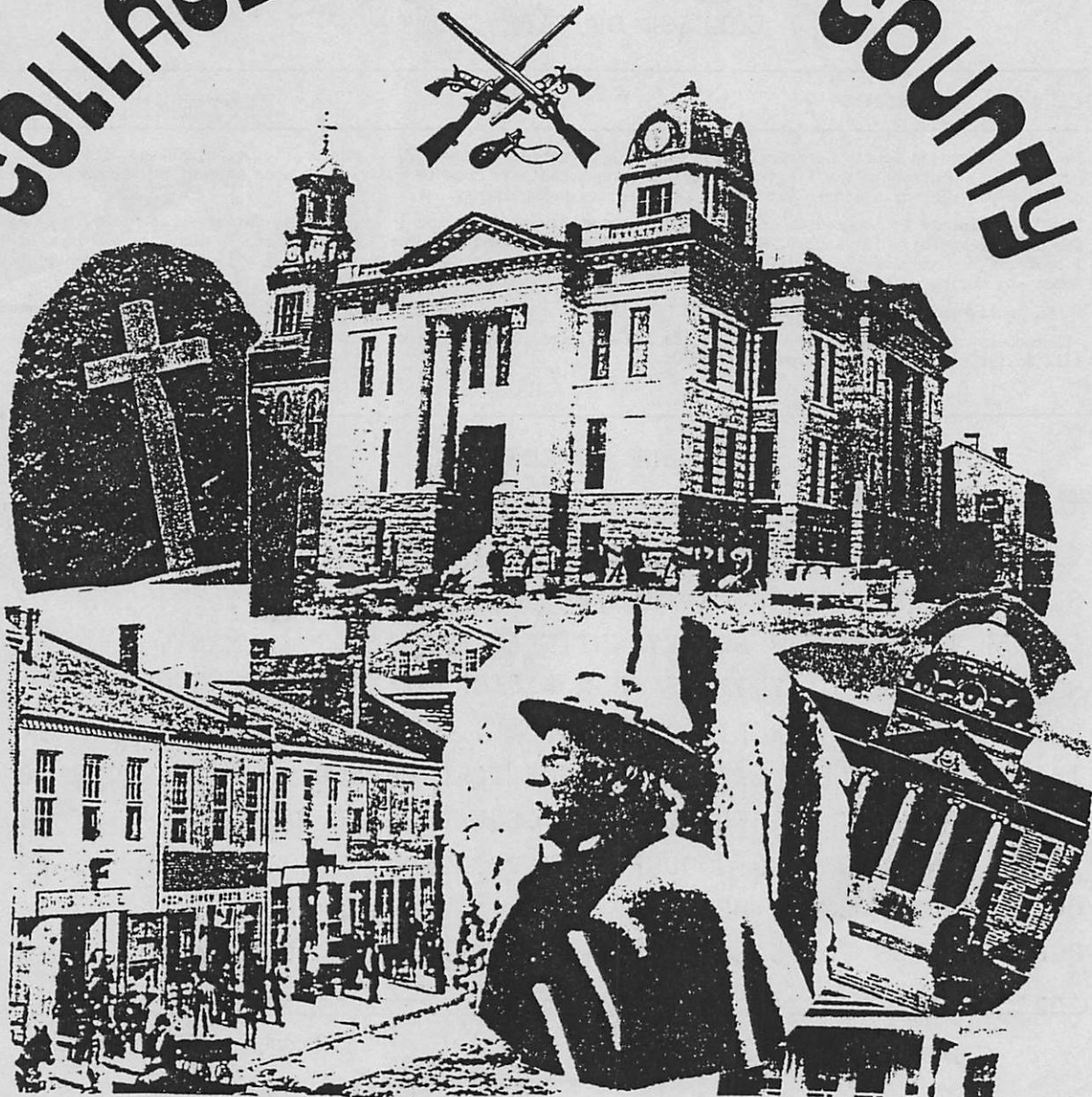

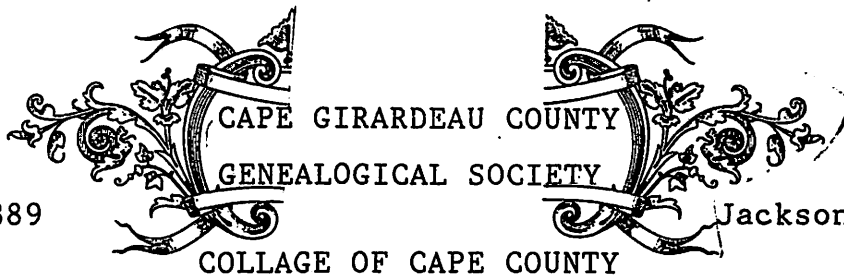

of Charles Schenimann

August the 29 1862

Dear Mother I take this favertibial oppitunety to write a few lineas to you and to let you noue that I am wal.

And hoping that thouse few lineas will fine you in as good helth as I am now or better. for I have a Bite on my rite thie whitch dis abals me from riding and paneas vry much.

but I must tel you about our grate Scout on friday morning last Wee were ordared to bee ready for a Scout. So we taken the St. Luke road and on the road we found out that wee were to rout a nest of Rebels about 300 Strong and wee were about the same number in the evening about 2 oclock the first pickits fired on us and about 4 oclock wee were in the Rebels Camp but they run away and left there guns, coats, blankets there meat on the fire the Bread in the Skillet theire Horses hitch and way they went.. Thare wer 7 Kild but I only seen one

there was 3 waggins taken and Horses and Mules thare were 2 Horses of ours shot. but nun of our men got hurt. I think that was avery good capture

Dear Mother I must tel you suthing about the march to Bloomfald all along the Roade the officers of oure Co wer about half Drunk

Dear Mother I can not write all this time So foreveal

My Dear Mother I have left you but there is one that will never leave as long as I live and that Love.

O Mother doan't greave to much about me onley trust God and he sertncy will not forgit us.

O Mother Should I Stay at Home and Sea our Govrment lost No indead not So long as I have a arm to Strike.

O if it be my time to dye I will go to my Father in Heaven where Rebels will never meat us eny more wee will live in peas and part no more.

Mother I gefs I will Sea you all Sune

We are 2 meileas from Paterson. It is verey mudey heare but I have Sean Sum of the hildeast cuntrey I ever Sean. I never receaed my clothing. I doant now whether Moter Sent them or not but I am to fare a way from you to have eny news from you only by letter. So I write the first letter in our Co. We weaded St. fransis whitch was at that tine over knee deap we croast on the 7th of Nov it Raned 2 Days whitch made the road very mudey and waden the river made it very disgrabeal for us.

Juley I am as helthey as you ever Saw me and I feal as stout as I ever did.

Juley I can't tell you where we are going for there are so meny reportes that I cant tell nothing about it Sum Says we are going Littel Rock in Arcansis and Sum Seas one plase and Sum another but the general opnion is that we are going to Littel Rock and I think so to

Dear Sister I must tel you about oure afares along the road we had plenty Flouer and we had plenty fleters (friters)? that wes not half dun.

We had no crackers sen we left Jackson

but fenses and chickens and Gease Hoags Cattel and Sheps did not fare very wal

the Farmers will long remember the 29

Frits Kosterman is verey mutch dis sates fied

but we are in joying good heatlh so fare

So I must hasten to a cloas

Mother Souldern is not So nice as one might Suppose the Battel fealds lucks bad enof but the Doctors cuting the mens Legs and arms and throwing them in to the River lucks wors then eny at the Battel at Vicksburg we fel on every Sid August Buchhartt fell on one Sid and T. Rambo on the other and meny others to tedias to mencion thay have dyed on both Sids of me Sence I never witnest So meny deth in my life as I have Since the Batl Kild Snubinger Dull Tomson Waber j Neaber Co F wounded A. Burchart H. Ast Miller Bambo Dbolt Lt Klostarmann that is the names of kild and wounded Co F and John W. Smeth mision Co. G.

I have writen 6 letters home and no ancer yet I look with Fasions when the male Bats whisels every Day but I must come to a clos so no more at Present my Love to you and Juley Henry . . Marey and all my inquiring frends

Dear Mother I left the Hospital at Paducah Ky on the 24th of March I write this Letter from Cairo Ills I landed here on the 29 of March 1863 on Sunday a bout 9 oclock in the Knight the Boys all came out of the Tents when thay hered that it was I. I am chered and Sum Sed wold not have came back If thay had bin in my plase and Sum Sed I nowed that Charles wold come back as Sune as he got abel I new thare he was to much in to Soldier about him to stay at Home next Morning thay came round me like Beas the Boys told me that the Engenere Regt was campt close by So I went to Sea them yester day here the Came round me like a Swarme of Bees Shaken Hands How are you Charley you got back a gane Yess I want to try the Rebels agan Buley for you and So on

this morning here Shold I See but Fetch and L. Klosterman thay gave me the Soks and the Soacheg and a letter thay tell you all are in good Health whitch I was glad to here and the Sauchedg was the best that I Ever Eat

Mother Yongs Point is Just on the other Sid of the River from Vicksburg we can See the Rebels at Vicksburg every time from oure Tents and See the Cannons thare

the Army is Still at present

the Bend Boys I Sean them all but Fred Stawsing he is ded Luey Schwattmann Sick at a Hospital the rest are all wal thare has Sum Dyed out of oure Regt Sens I have absant. Tomas Sheppard died and Henrey Rettgar died here Hrsan Alban is Sick and Sead Whilcans and J. Whalan are both Sick with the Small Focks

Dear Mother I doant think that I can come Home Sune I think that you had better Rent the Farm out if you can and Sell Oald Sam for what you can guet for him if it is only \$25 Dolers as I think that he is to much trubel for you but you know what is best and due what you think best

Dear Brother Since I came down here the Dr. detaled me for a Hospital Nurse I was not wiling at first but I Stad one weeke and Satterday I left with out eney orders So this Morning he put me under a rest untell futher orders but I feel quiet esey he can not detale no nuncmms ant officls at all So we will about it wither Lut Bader is my Commander or the Dr. I thot I had beter write to you then Sum body els So you have the Strate of it Lut Bader Ses he will have me all right in a fue days but I must tell you Sumthing els 12 Gunboats run the Blockad last Thirsday Night I wish you cold have Sean them and herd the rore of about 250 Cannons thay Shuck the Ground like an urth quick it was a rore like hevey Thunder we cld See the black of the Rebel Guns very plane the Gunboat Benton of St, Louis She was in the advance and the Comador aboard of her She is like the Trups She feires nether man nor Devel like Gen Smith he Ses If thay will give him all Mo. Trupes he can whip the Devel out of his Den onley one got hurt a litel and She is now repaired they have bin fighten ever Since

Dear Brother we are camped about 6 miles above Vicksburg it is an oald Feald of about 500 akers in it and the River is So high here that the water is around us here We can go to the Levey the water is in oure rere wood is verey Scarse here thare is plenty tow but it is a under wauter Henrey the Canal is of no use at all that is the first one across the Point but thare has bin another bin dug from Miligens Bend thare has Severl Boats all redy gon thru thare So the Say

Henry the Regt. lleft here Sune after I came down here to Greenville thare are nun left but the Sick and the wounded I have Sein good times here Sence I have bin down here I have Seen the Engr Regt of the West here and I Saw all the Boyes F. Stawsing he is ded Luey Schwettmann is Sick at Jackson Tenn tthe Balance are all wal the 8th Mo Regt is close by thare are Severl aquantens thare and the 3th Mo Regt is here Walrat Mole blongs to it I have Sean him Sevrl times He is Regt. mentel Black Smith he is the biggest man I ever Saw he Ses that would lik to Se you and Marev So I must Close my fue lines by Saying that we Sure hope to bee in Vicksburg. So no more at presant youre afectnet Brother C. Schenimann

Dear Mother wee was pad off on the 26 of Aprile for Fore Monts whtch amounts to \$52 of which I Sent you \$45 by Juge Daley of St Louis he will deliver it to oure Lut, Baders Brother at the Cape his name is William Bader the Money is in a letter you will onley inquire fore a letter for Chrestenia Schenimann if thare is eny expence Plesse pay it Nerley all oure Regt has Sent thare Money that way oure Compney Sent thare Money to William Bader at the Cape Just as I have dun the Officers Sent thare Money the Same way So if the Money is lost it is not just mine aline. I all So Sent Sum close by the Adams expres to H. D. Breneka at the Cape thare is 4 of us Henrey Osenkop William Waise Fredrick Klostarmann and my Self

H. Osenkop W. Wises is tyed together and the name on them But it is all in one Box myne and Fredrick are luse in the Box Fred has onley one Blanket and I have one dubel Blanket and 2 Grat Coats 2 Sherts 1 Cumfurt 1 pare of Gloves the Boys have Sent thare close Home by the Express the Express is verey high here it caust us \$7 for the Box you will please pay Mr. H. D. Breninekey for his trubel

Dear Mother I Sent one Leter to Brother Henrey Stating that I was under an orest fore leven the Hospital with out orders but the Dr releved me the next Morning and I have bin with the Co. ever Sence but I am onley duing light duty the Regtment we left Yonges Point on the 26th we are at Miligens Bend now but the Regtment left this Morning on an expdision to fix a road to New Richmond La. the Tents are all here yet the Sickley ones and a good meny other things

Dear Mother I allso Sent you a Letter Stating that we were going to Vicksburg but we Came here in the plase of Vicksburg it is 25 miles father up the River then Yonges Point this is avery nise plase here but it is very warm here theare has bin a goodeal of fighting at Vicksburg latley we are now Sum 35 miles from thare but we heard the cannons all Day yesterday

Mother we heard that the Cape was taken whetch caused a good deal of excitment in the Regt. here and thay Swore that if thay were back thare thay wold fight them Night and day. Mother the Taulke is here that we are going back to Mo. that we may but not Sune

Mother every thing is verey high here Butter is 50 Sence a pound and Eggs 50 Sent a Dusen and So forth 1 Glalss of bere 15 Sence 1 appel a bout as large as an Egg for 5 Sents

but I must hasten to a close So fore wal Derest Mother from youre affectnet Sun Charles Schenimann

Pink silk dress worn by Miss Sarah Cannon. Pre Civil War era.

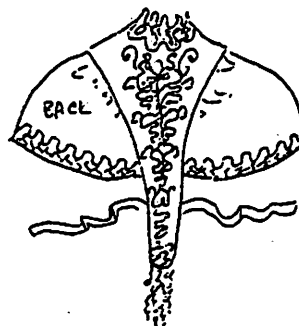
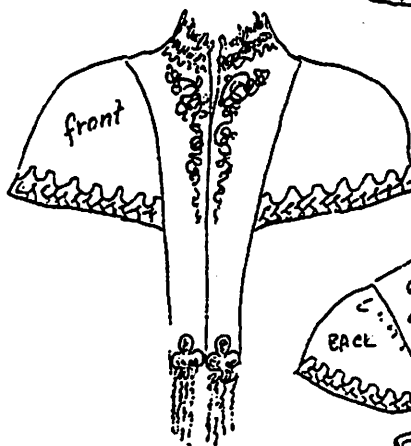

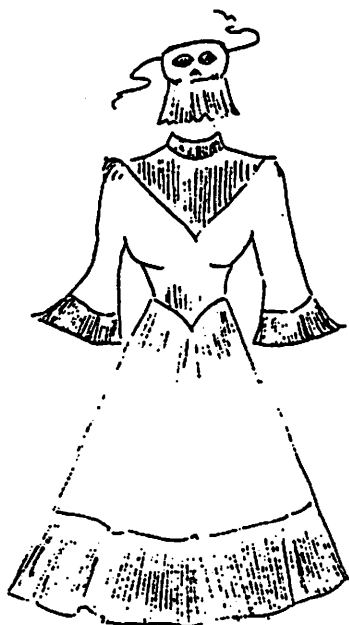

This list was taken from Pastor Umbeck Notebook (1850-57). Births and marriages were noted by this pastor. They had taken place in Egypt Mills, Hanover, Dutchtown, & Tilsit. A translation of this notebook is in our library at Jackson.

REV. FREDERICK WILHELM UMBECK

FREDERICH WILHELM UMBECK, b. 1804 Germany- d. California, MO. 1857
 His will (written in German) is recorded in Book C-page 263 -filed 9 Jan. 1858.

He married in Germany to ¹⁸²⁹ *Barmen, Ger.*
 JOHANNA MARIA STEINHAULER b. 1808 -d. 6 July, ¹⁸⁴⁸ before 1850

They were the parents of the following children all born in Dabringhausen,

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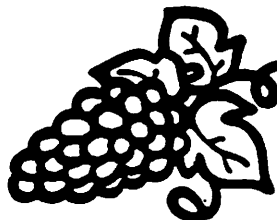
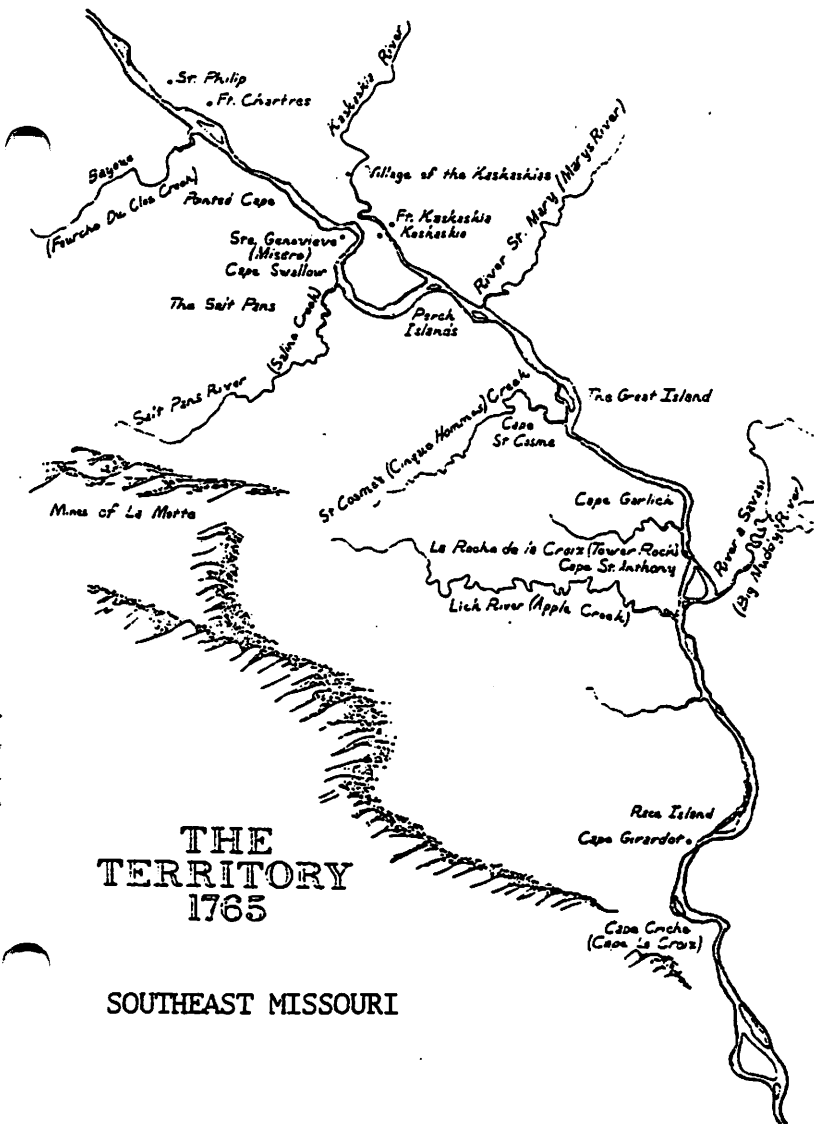
