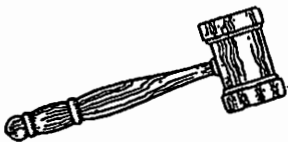
From the President

Dear Cape Girardeau County Genealogical Society Members,

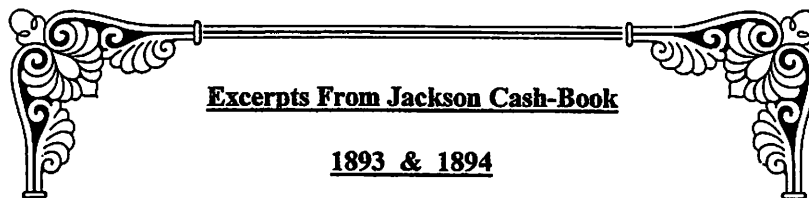
First of all, it is my sad duty to report the passing of another of our honorary life members, Alice Spillman, who passed away on April 29, 2005. Alice was a stalwart member of the society up to about 10 years ago. She was one of a dedicated group who recorded cemeteries, transcribed original documents, and prepared records for microfilming in the 1980s. Alice served for a long time as the corresponding secretary and principal researcher for the Society. Many of our long-time members will fondly remember working with or corresponding with Alice Spillman as they were researching their Cape Girardeau Co. families. Alice had been in ill health for a number of years, and we mourn her passing and the loss of another valued member of the Society.

Our library's move to the Cape Girardeau County Archive Center occurred at the end of May. The move went faster than I anticipated, but we still have work to do in sorting through quarterlies and other materials, and getting file materials organized. I really want to thank Jane Randol Jackson, Ruth Moreland and her granddaughters, Dorothy Rowley, Dawn Detring, Sandra and Larry Fluegge, and especially John Flentge for helping with the move. Several others helped in varying ways, and I wish to thank those whose names I am not mentioning! The collection looks great in its new quarters, and it is very nice working with both the library and original resources at the same location! For those coming from out of town, the Archive Center is at 112 East Washington in Jackson, Missouri. It is across Highway 61 (East Washington) and north of the Courthouse Annex and diagonally across from (northeast of) the Cape Girardeau Co. Courthouse. Parking is available at the Courthouse Annex, or at the church parking lot around the corner if you do not want to risk crossing the busy street. Call 573-204-2331 if you have any questions or need detailed directions to the Archive Center. Again, we will continue to hold our regular meetings in January, March, May, July, September, and November at Riverside Regional Library, 308 East Union in Jackson.

Our program in September will be given by the ever-popular Lorena Shell Eaker, who will speak on "New and Unpublished Goodies Found in My Files." Mrs. Eaker is a long-time researcher on German families west of the Catawba River in North Carolina, many of whom moved to Southeast Missouri in the early days of settlement of the area. She is in the process of scanning her files, and there are many unpublished "finds" waiting to see the light of day in them. Plan to come and see this interesting program on September 27 at Riverside Regional Library in Jackson, Missouri!

**THE GARRETT FAMILY
OF
MISSOURI**

WILLIAM GARRETT, SR.
ca 1715-ca 1799

Although the Garrett line America commences with William Garrett and the first Jamestown Colony in 1607, the clearly documented lineage beings with a later WILLIAM GARRETT, SR. He was a large landowner in Gloucester, Louisa, Spotsylvania, and Albemarle counties in Virginia and a planter in Louisa County in the middle of the 18th century (1761). He was born around 1715, probably the son of John Garrett, Jr. Documentation supports the belief that the line is descended from the William Garrett of the Jamestown Colony, but no clear connection may be proven.

About 1735, William Garrett, Sr. married Elizabeth Ashton. See the Ashton group. There had been much intermarriage among the Garretts and Ashtons in England prior to 1700. The home of William Garrett, Sr., from 1767, was Trinity Parish in Louisa County. He was sworn in as Justice of the Peace in Louisa County on 15 April 1771. A substantial portion of William Garrett Sr.'s land holdings were on the North Fork of the Pamunkey River, in the vicinity of other family relations including the Winstons, Carrs, Meriwethers, Crenshaws, Crawfords, and Beazleys. The extent of his land holdings can perhaps be better measured by the monetary bond for £100,000 required of the executors of his will.

The children of William and Elizabeth (Ashton) Garrett, as named in his will of 3 February 1779, were as follows:

1. William Garrett, Jr., born ca 1740, died 1817, lived most of his life in Louisa County. He married Ann Johnson on 10 December 1770. Their son, William Garrett III served as a private in Captain William Taylor's Company of the 2nd Virginia Regiment commanded by Col. Alexander Spotswood. The descendants of this line moved to Maryland and lived in Baltimore and Rockville.
2. John Garrett, born ca 1745, died without issue in 1770.
3. HENRY GARRETT, father of Peter R. Garrett of Cape Girardeau, was born about 1745 and died in 1815 in Kentucky. He married Mary Johnson, daughter of Major Thomas Johnson of Roundabout Castle where the family lived for many years. Ancestor - see later.
4. Ann Garrett married William Johnson of Roundabout Castle in Louisa County.
5. Elizabeth Garrett married Thomas Terrell.
6. Susanna Garrett married Richard Johnson, son of Nicholas Johnson and Elizabeth Hudson.

HENRY GARRETT
1745-1815

CAPTAIN HENRY GARRETT, son of William Garrett, Sr., and the father of Peter R. Garrett, lived in Louisa County and Albemarle, Virginia. He was a close friend was Patrick Henry. Henry Garrett owned large tracts of land, held public office, and served in the Revolutionary War. Henry Garrett has left many records of his career in Virginia and Kentucky.

In 1770, Captain Henry Garrett is recorded as a member of the Virginia Militia, as part of the Virginia Association of Burgesses, Merchants and Citizens. Henry Garrett appears as Clerk of the Committee of Safety of Louisa County on 4 December 1774. The qualified voters of each county elected these committee members.

Henry Garrett also appears as a Private in Captain John Blackwell's Company, No. 4, as it stood on 1 April 1778. This was part of the 3rd Virginia Regiment commanded by Col. William Heth. The Adjutant General of the War Department further states that Henry Garrett also enlisted in February 1778 for one year and discharged 28 February 1779. Family records, as noted in the Gardner genealogy of the Garrett family, state that Henry Garrett finished his military career fighting as a Captain of a Louisa Company in the Battle of Yorktown and witnessed the surrender of Cornwallis in 1781.

Captain Henry Garrett qualified as Sheriff of Louisa County on 12 August 1800. In 1810, he moved to Kentucky and settled in Fayette County, near Lexington. Some of his sons had preceded him in this move. Henry Garrett died in testate in Kentucky in 1815.

The children of Henry and Mary Garrett included the following:

1. Ira Garrett, born 1772 and died in 1870. He married Elizabeth Watson, daughter of John Watson and Jane Price of Charlottesville, Virginia. Ira Garrett commenced his life in Albemarle County after leaving Louisa, by serving as a Sheriff. He was a Deputy from 1815 to 1817. Soon after, he became Deputy County Clerk under his brother, Alexander Garrett, and in 1831 succeeded him as County Clerk.
2. Alexander Garrett, born 1775 and died in 1860. He married first Elizabeth Minor, daughter of James Minor. He married second Evelina Bolling, daughter of John Bolling and Mary Kennon. He was a close friend of Thomas Jefferson and had a distinguished public career. He was County Clerk in Albemarle County; first Proctor and Treasurer of Central College; and first Bursar of the University of Virginia, which he helped found. He was named a trustee of Thomas Jefferson's will and was with Jefferson at his death. He placed Thomas Jefferson in his death shroud.
3. Thomas Johnson Garrett, born 1777 and died in 1855. He married first Lucinda Terrell and second Nancy Thomson of Georgetown, Kentucky. He lived in Lexington, Mt. Sterling, and Greenup, Kentucky. Descendants of this line included the Marshall Field III family of Chicago, whose daughter, Ethel, married Captain David Beatty of the British Navy, hero of the Battle of Jutland, and later to be named as an Earl.
4. Henry Garrett, Jr.
5. Francis Garrett.
6. Peter R. Garrett, later of Cape Girardeau, born 11 June 1787 and died in Jackson, Missouri on 7 December 1840. He moved to Kentucky prior to his father and is shown on the 1800 Census of Kentucky in Lexington, Fayette County. Peter R. Garrett later moved to Cape Girardeau, Missouri in 1821, where he married Mary Jane Whitelaw. Ancestor - see later.
7. Clarissa Garrett married Thomas Millam who moved to Palmyra, Missouri.
8. Captain Ashton Garrett moved to Kentucky with his father and brothers. In 1817, Ashton Garrett deeded 1,000 acres on Highland Creek and various lots in Frankfort. On 6 March 1828, he married Nancy M. Spangler in Lexington. After Ashton Garrett's death, his widow, Nancy, married Thomas Millam, a widower, who had previously been married to Clarissa Garrett. They raised a substantial family in Palmyra, Missouri.

PETER R. GARRETT
1787-1840

Peter R. Garrett was an attorney and Clerk of the County Court in Cape Girardeau from 1824 to 1840. He was descended from families that were among the first to settle in Virginia and included many relations and friends important in American history. The Garrett family of Virginia played important roles in the formation of Jamestown, Williamsburg, Charlottesville, the University of Virginia, and in the administration of Thomas Jefferson.

Born in Albemarle County, Virginia on 11 June 1787, Peter R. Garrett moved first to Kentucky around 1800 and then to Cape Girardeau County about 1821. He married Mary Ann Whitelaw, daughter of Nicholas Whitelaw and Elizabeth Beazley, on 29 July 1827 in Cape Girardeau. He died on 7 December 1840 and was buried in Jackson (?). His widow, Mary Ann Whitelaw Garrett later married Fred Ehrman on 23 March 1845 in Cape Girardeau and died on 20 May 1874 in Cape Girardeau. An extensive genealogy of the Whitelaw family has been prepared by Rodney Whitelaw Jueneman and was presented to the Cape Girardeau County Genealogical Society.

Peter and Mary Garrett had six children. She had one additional child by her second marriage to Frederick Burkman Ehrman in 1845.

1. Mary Elizabeth Garrett, born 16 July 1828, married Charles Davis on 10 Jan 1846. He was Mayor of Cape Girardeau in 1849. After the death of Charles Davis, Mary married Charles Wall. Charles and Elizabeth (Garrett) Wall lived in Charleston, Mississippi County. Children included Ella Wall, David Wall, Mary Wall, Addie Wall, and Josephine (Phenie) Wall.
2. William Gayoso Garrett, born 14 April 1830 and died in 1887 in Cape Girardeau. He apparently was married at one time, but his wife's name is unknown. He was a business partner with James N. Whitelaw, his uncle.
3. Paul Alexander Garrett, born 25 May 1830 and died Feb 1904 in Virginia City, Montana where he had mining claims. He was married prior to moving to the Colorado Territories around 1850, but his wife's name is also unknown.
4. CLARA JOSEPHINE GARRETT, born 15 Sep 1835 and married to John W. Ramsey.
5. Thomas Franklin Van Buren Garrett, born 21 Mar 1837, married Susan M. Dean on 26 Oct 1865. She was the daughter of Edwin B. Deane and Susan Emeline Block. Thomas Franklin Garrett died 8 AUG 1885 in Brooklyn, New York but is buried in Cape Girardeau. One child, Dean Garrett.
6. Henry Ashton Garrett, born Aug 1839 and died in 1841 in Cape Girardeau.

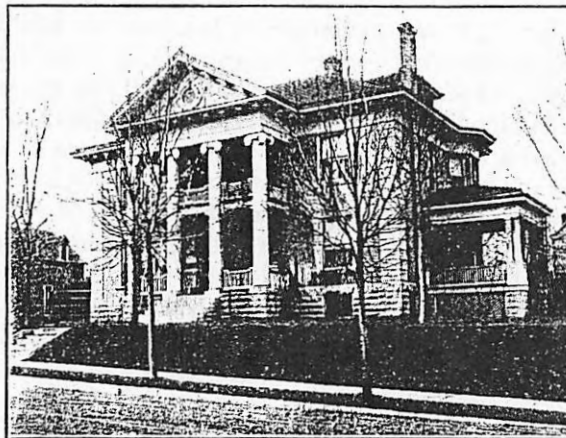

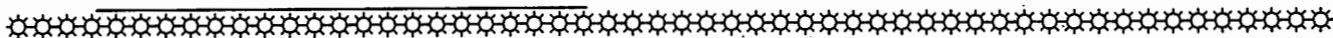

AN OLD LANDMARK GONE

Excerpt from the *Cape Girardeau County Post*, March 17, 1932

While taking a little drive on No. 25 Sunday afternoon we found that one familiar spot on that road had changed its aspects most radically, being the tract which in days gone by was the property of the Hubble Creek Baptist church. In late weeks the tract of one acre has been cleared of underbrush and trees and will soon be ready for the plow.

That church was organized in 1860 by Elders J. H. Clark and J. C. Maple. Among its first members were J. C. and Susan Taylor, B. S. and Martha S. Taylor, Martha Gorden, M. E. Taylor, R. M. and T. W. English, Z. T. and M. A. Lail, James Benson, A. B. and S. E. Chary and A. J. English. The first church was a log building, supplanted by a frame building in 1865. There it stood among a grove of forest giants until the membership had dwindled by death or removal so that as a church it was abandoned. It is proper here to add that among the leading members of later years (and that was a good while ago) were John VanAmburgh, John B. Tooke, Jasper Williams, Tom English, L. M. Bean, and Wm. Thompson. The building stood vacant and deserted until a few years ago it was torn down. Only the lot remained, overgrown with briars and brush, and now that is gone and in a year hence when crops are growing on that tract nothing will remain to mind the wayfarer that here at one time stood one of the old churches of the county.



ANDREW WELSCH FAMILY

Andrew Welsch (son of Andrew Welsch and Eva (Schafer) Welsch) was born 25 Feb, 1807 in Meissenheim, Baden, Germany, a small village on the east bank of the Rhine River. He died 6 Oct 1866 and was buried in Old Lorimier Cemetery, at Cape Girardeau.

In Nov 1851, with his wife Anna Marie (Hockenjos) Welsch and eight children, Andrew emigrated to the U. S. They entered through the port of New Orleans, up the Mississippi River to Cape Girardeau and settled in the Tilsit community. Church records list him as a farmer.

A German researcher writes, Andrew had 1,495 florins when he left Germany, "a small property" but more than most emigrants of that period had. This translates to approximately \$600 U. S. in 1851.

About three and a half years after their arrival, Anna Marie died 4 Jan 1855, four months after the birth of a daughter, Henriette Frederickca Elizabeth on 14 Sep 1854. Anna Maria is probably buried near Tilsit.

The Cape County marriage records show the marriage of Andrew Welsch and Maria Hahn 14 Mar 1863. However, his estate filed 10 Oct 1866, Cape Girardeau Common Pleas Court, gives heirs: wife, Amelia, children: Barbara Sperling, Eva Reinecke, Maria Rippert, Christine Herwig, Magdalene Weiser, Andrew (Jr.) and George Welsch. Apparently, the baby, Henriette, born in the U. S., did not live to be an adult.

After research trips to Germany and Missouri, correspondence with relatives and professional researchers, the following information was collected about the descendants of Andrew and Anna Maria Welsch.

This family history was gathered by the descendants of Andrew Welsch [Jr.], who died in Woodward County, Oklahoma, in 1915. He was a Civil War veteran, having served in the 4th and 5th Missouri Cavalries from 1862 to 1865 as a volunteer. He learned the blacksmith trade in the Army and became an expert at building heavy

SLAVE NARRATIVES

[Editor's Note: Both of these slave narratives are from ex-slaves who were born in Stoddard County.]

ELIZA MADISON

I was born in Stoddard County, Missouri. My mother belonged to John Sitzes and my father belonged to Lark Abernathy. I can jes' remember how afraid we chillum was of de soldiers. De boss had a big plantation and raised everything dey ate and wore. We had a cabin dat joined on to the house. My mother was jus' like a man and worked in de fiel' and made rails. My aunt wove. I picked up chips. My mother was the type dat they had to treat good. De master had eight children. There was a white school of three months. I did not go to school.

After de war was over we all worked for twenty-five cents a day but didn't get paid in money but in food. Mother was sold twice, and my father was sold away from my mother. I don't 'member anything 'bout my father. I was 'bout four years old when de war ended. 'Bout all we did on Sunday was to dig ginseng and fish. One of de slaves would go out to a dance and get in in de mornin' and he would get a whippin'.

After de war some Ku Klux come through our place and de white folks said they could tell who dey were by de walk. After de war was over de soldiers were going to take some of de colored women south, so we hid under de stairway. De soldiers fought to get de slaves to go and my mother had a scar on her should dat dey made. De soldiers took some of de slaves south and sold them somewhar' and we never heard from them again.

Black root was a purgative medicine as well as goose grease. For whooping-cough dey would use honey and alum.

At Christmas we'd get candy or a new dress. On one Christmas old Christine or Santa Clause would wrap up in a blanket and this is how we got our presents. Down thar de hickory nuts grew big and it was a funny thing when we found out dat old Christine was giving us our own hickory nuts.

I can't 'member 'bout any hoodoo business but once a Negro man borrowed a pair of boots from another man and when he returned them there was a snake's tooth sticking up through de sole of one of de boots.

Interview with Eliza Madison,
ex-slave, aged 75, Fredericktown, Mo.

WYLIE MILLER

I'se gonna be 83 cum nex' November. Mah mammy's name wuz Easter. We belong to Ole Mass Henry Miller so we goes by de name o' Miller. Mah daddy's name was Israel an' he belong to a neighbor name Brown so he go by de name o' Brown. Old Missus name was 'Frohnien dey had three boys whut went off tuh war. Dey lives in a two-story frame house—det down close to Bloomfiel'

De fust time we ever seed sojers, dey wuz a big crowd o' 'em cum up to our place, When us chillern seed 'em we crawl under de house—white and black, all o' us. De Blue Coats look unner dere an' dey say, "Come out o' der, you, or we kill all o' you". We's sure scared but we crawls out. Dey didden hurt us none, but dey 'rests Ole Boss. Dey takes him up stairs an' ack's him things. I spects dey didden do him no harm but dey keeps him locked up.

Dey wuz a feller hangin' roun' dere named Bolen, Nas' Bolen—he wuz a bush-wacker and we seed dem Blue coats chase 'em across a ten acre fiel' but dey didden catch 'em. Den dey take all de bes' meat in de smoke house—we sho' did hate to stan' dere an' see 'em cut down all dem good hams.

An' dey had de women folks inside a cookin' fo' 'em, an' a bakin' bread. An' de sojers wuz all roun' de bahn an' de gran'ries feedin' our cahn to dey horses. When de sojers lef', my mammy an' a feller name Nash Miller escape an' go off wid de sojers.

Den one time de Seeseshes, under Marmaduke, come through dar on dey way to Cape. De Blue Coats was camped at Round Pond an' der de Rebel sojers run into 'em an' dar's whar dey had de big battle. De Rebels nebber bother us non nuther 'cept jes' for gin.

When de war was ober, Ole Massa call us all up to de fron' porch and tell us now de war is ober an' we is free, but it don' make much difference. We stays dar jes' de same for few year. Ole Massa wuz allus good to his cullud folks, but fo' a spell he had a overseer. He wuz a Denmarker an' his name wuz Martindale an' he wuz tuff.

I 'members one night de Ku Kluxers came—dey wants a drink o' water. One man say, "Gimme some water. I aint' had no drink sence de battle of Shilo." I had to carry water for him 'bout ez fur as fum here to cross de street and dat man drink five big buckets full an say he want mo'. My young Massa was [sic], he step up, an' tell um to leave here an' he say, "Wylie, don't you carry no mo' water". Dey don' wantta go—dey had on white gowns button' up de front wid black buttons an' masks on dey faces.

Young Jes, he had a pistol. He call it a Remin ton an' he jes as soon shoot 'em as to say "Hodey-do!" So he tell 'em again, "Git out fum here, I know you." Den dey goes but dey say to me, "Boy, we don' wanna ketch you out at night"—and didden.

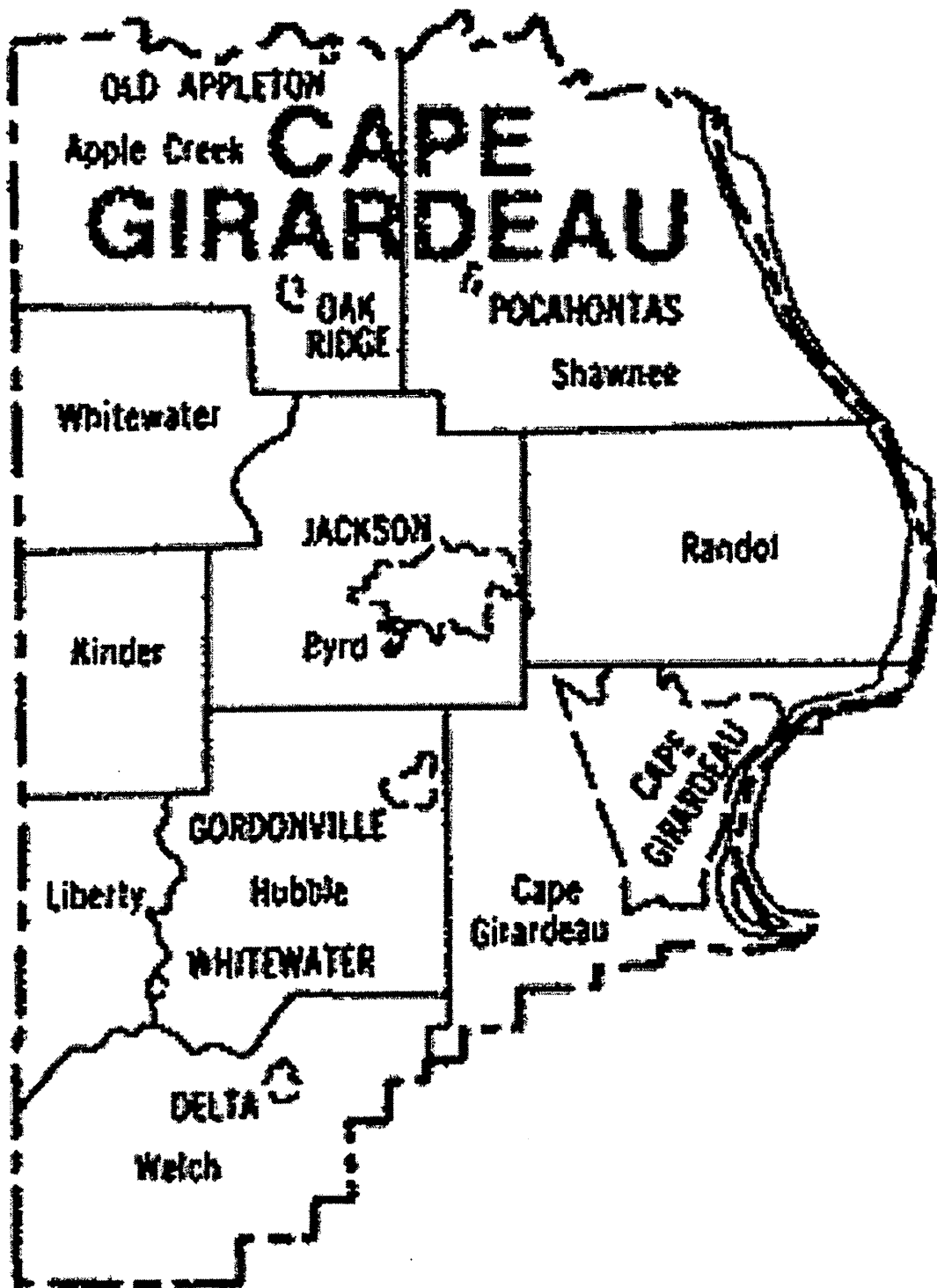
