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

From the President

Dear Cape Girardeau County Genealogical Society Members,

So, when do you stop doing research? I've heard long-time researchers say on a number of occasions that there is, "no more to be found," and that they are going to stop researching. But, is there? In my experience and in most cases, there always seems to be more to be found. I'll give an example. On my recent trip to North Carolina, I focused on "fleshing out" several of the ancestors for whom I already had the basics of marriage, children, death date (at least approximate), land, etc. So, a lot of what I looked at was probate files. As is so often stated by experienced genealogists, we should always look for the neighbors as well. A number of my ancestors were in old Lincoln County, North Carolina (includes present-day Gaston and Catawba counties). I have particular concentrations of ancestral families on Leepers and Killians Creeks, and in the vicinity of present-day north-central Gaston County (on its border with Lincoln County). Thus, if you look at the probate file of one ancestor, it is likely you will find one or more others in the papers. My ancestor John Eddlemon owned land on Killian's Creek, and even though he later moved to Maury County, Tennessee and left no discernible probate file there, he popped up in another ancestor's probate file, purchasing at the sale (I could say the same thing about his son, my ancestor Henry Edlemon, several times.) Not only that, I found a note owed to John Eddlemon by another neighbor (an additional relative), a copy of which was included in the probate file. This is the first possibility I've found for a signature for John, and I now know he signed with a mark.

Obviously we should all stop at some point and write up what we have. Why? So others can benefit from our work, so we can clarify what we know, or so we can provide something for our children. Many people helped all of us in our research, so we only owe the genealogical community our help and data in return. Don't talk yourself out of this—in most cases, YOU are the expert and should provide us with what you know. There are tons of aids for writing a family history, but the best one is to just resolve to do it!

It is my hope that, by the time you receive this, we will have another President for the Society. I am, frankly, out of good ideas and energy for the group—although I'm still good for another decade or so as editor of *Collage*. That is, of course, unless someone else really wants to do it.

Some Early History of Old Appleton and Section 16, Township 33 N, Range 12 E

The constitution of Missouri called for a township school in each six by six mile square of land, more commonly called townships, as soon as practicable and necessary. Section 16 of each Congressional township had to be sold as school land and the money put on interest, along with other monies to establish and support our public school system. Missouri became a state in 1821. At that time land was surveyed, large rocks were laid to mark the section corners, and smaller rocks to mark the quarter sections.




Figure 2. Joseph McLane's old store in the Mocas Towns at the big bend of Apple Creek. He kept it with Euan Y. McKee.

Joseph McLane purchased the E ½ of the NE ¼ of Section 16, Township 33 N, Range 12 E, containing 80 acres, in Nov 1848, from the U. S. government (Figure 1). The Apple Creek Valley, Goshen, Liberty, and Buckeye school districts were later to corner on the southwest corner of this land. It is not known when the house pictured was built. (Figure 2). (Both Joseph McLane and Alfred McLane had sawmills and grist mills about one mile apart on Apple Creek by 1837.) The Ray Lowes

family was the last to live in the house. Other families known to have lived there were Frederick and Malissa Schweer Schmidt, Charles and Susan Schmidt Wilson, Murray and Nora Puntmann Wilson. Ray Lowes was a grandson of Charles and Susan Wilson and a nephew of Murray Wilson. Frederick was a brother of Susan Wilson. I took the photo about 40 years ago. Along with his mills and blacksmith shop, Joseph McLane also had a store in company with Euan Y. McKee. These buildings were located in the large bend of Apple Creek and across into Perry County, about one mile west of the mill at Appleton.

An old public road made its way along the western edge of the 80 acres Joseph McLane owned in Section 16. It passed the late Rito Petzoldt place, where it was said that groceries and other supplies could be purchased. A blacksmith shop and other remembrances are known of a small settlement at the fork of the King's Highway north of the Petzoldt home.

El Camino Real, or King's Highway, was laid out in 1789 from New Madrid to Ste. Genevieve. According to Will Gerhardt, an early historian and native of Appleton, who married by mother's first cousin, El Camino Real turned west from present-day Highway 61 to cross Buckeye Creek, then Hughes Creek at the old Thompson place. The road made its way northward through the wilderness to the McLanes Mills (later Kimmel Mill) blacksmith shop and store in the big bend of Apple Creek. From the bend, the road went north through the old Indian Mocas Towns to Uniontown. A fork in the road north of the Petzoldt home, turned eastward past the late Charles Lowes (John Kiepe) farm and on to the present Highway 61 south of Appleton.

In 1787 the Spanish Government invited a band of 1,200 Shawnee and 600 Delaware Indians to come from Ohio. They lived in villages, and one known to the French as Le Grand Village Sauvage was situated not far south of Uniontown. By 1824 most of these Indians were removed to Kansas.

After 1824, land began to be settled more quickly by European descendants. The County Court records still referred to the area around the bend as the Mocas Towns. In 1837, a road was laid

out from Joseph McLane's mills on Apple Creek to Neely's Landing. At about the same time in 1837, a road from Alfred McLane's mills on Apple Creek was laid out to Jackson. As early as May 26, 1824, commissioners were appointed to mark out a road from John McClain's Mill on Apple Creek to Cape Girardeau.

On Sep 3, 1885, my grandfather, Charles Engelmann, purchased land near Kimmel's Mill. This evidently was the old Joseph McLane Mill. Mr. Engelmann was married May 4, 1886, to Miss Louisa Krattli, a sister of Mary, wife of the Rev. Theophilus Kies, minister of the Zion Methodist Church near Appleton. The house that Mr. Engelmann built on the land in 1886 is still in good condition. It is owned today by the Seiler family.

Most of grandfather's land lay in Perry County. Deeds to the land found in Book 12, page 639, and Book 13, page 114, in Perry County, describe a water mill, blacksmith shop, and dwelling house. Grandmother Louisa's grandfather, George Krattli, had drowned in the Rhine River in Switzerland. She worried that their two small sons and Charles would take chances crossing Apple Creek, although there was a good crossing there. In 1898 the Engelmann family purchased the Dow farm, three air miles north of Oak Ridge.

In addition to the water mills and blacksmith shop, there was also a store. The store was owned by Joseph McLane and Euan Y. McKee. Delos Seabaugh gave us the photo of the old store. He and Bea Rudisaile talked about the first Lodge Hall Meetings of the area being held there. My mother, who was born on Apple Creek in 1894, always spoke of the family going to Uniontown to do their shopping. She made no mention of a store near their home.

My uncle, Henry Engelmann, born Jun 4, 1887, said he played on the foundation of Kimmel's old mill. Evidently it had deteriorated or washed away by 1898, when the family moved from that farm. Uncle John Engelmann, born in 1889, remembered that the highway department told their father if they didn't have to build a bridge across Apple Creek, they would keep up the dead end road back to their house. Thus ended the King's Highway going through the big bend of Apple Creek.

There were several dwelling places along the road. I remember two large frame Tuschhoff houses, the Woeltje or Kinnison house and another house along the road near the Zion Methodist Church. All are gone except the Engelmann place, now Seiler, but the county still keeps up the road to the Engelmann house.

There were a few log houses in our area. Most of the early houses recalled were of frame construction. A beautiful large frame house that once stood on my farm was probably built by the Welty family before Missouri became a state in 1821. Any building built after 1821 was by choice between frame or log.

Google News for Genealogy

Google News is mainly used by many internet users to access current newspapers. But did you know there is a deep Google News Archive at http://news.google.com/archivesearch ? Newspapers and other digitized materials are available going back to the 1700's. More is being added all the time, so return regularly. The Google search is free, of course. Most of the material that is archived is also free to access, but there are also links to materials, like articles from Ancestry.com, Proquest, Lexis, or NewspaperArchive.com, that you have to pay a fee to access.

Use advanced search (http://news.google.com/archivesearch/advanced_searchfeature) to fine tune your search by zeroing on a particular date range, geographical area, or even a particular newspaper. You can choose to see all results, or only results that are available at no charge.

Fleming & Stevenson Obituaries

From the Alton Observer, Alton, Illinois; issue of Thursday, June 15, 1837; Page 3

Died at his residence in Cape Girardeau Co., Mo. The 16th of April, 1837, Mr. Mitchel Fleming, aged 76 years and 7 days. Mr. F. became hopefully pious at an early period of his life and sustained the high and responsible office of ruling elder in the Presbyterian church for the last 20 or 22 years; the duties of which of which he discharged in such a manner as gave evidence that he felt in some good degree, the solemnity of the work which had been committed to his care. He had been in feeble health for some years, and often expressed a desire to depart and be with his precious Savior; but still professed a willingness to wait his appointed time, until the Bridegroom of souls, should call him to the marriage supper of the Lamb. He felt a deep and lively interest in the prosperity of Christ's kingdom in the world, and especially in that portion of the vineyard over which he had been placed as a ruling elder. A few hours before his sprit took its flight from the body, he said, "I am not surprised that I am dying; but I am surprised that death does not execute his summons more speedily." He closed his own eyes, and sweetly fell asleep in the arms of Jesus, without a struggle or a groan. It may well be said of our departed friend, that he went down to the grave, like a shock of corn fully ripe.

Died in Cape Girardeau Co. Mo. May 2, 1837, Mrs. Jane Fleming, widow of Mr. M. Fleming, whose death we have just recorded, in the 61st year of her age. She was a member of Apple Creek church, of which her husband had been ruling elder, and gave comfortable evidence that she had experienced a change of heart, and manifested by her orderly walk and godly conversation that her affections were placed on things above, and not on things on the earth. She died in the exercise of her rational faculties, rejoicing in the hope of meeting her blessed Redeemer in heaven. We trust she is now celebrating the praises of God and the Lamb before the "great white throne," with her affectionate husband, whose loss she had mourned only a few weeks!

Departed this life in Cape Girardeau Co. Mo. the 8th of May, 1837, Mrs. Elizabeth Stevenson, consort of Mr. John Stevenson, in the 51st year of her age. Mrs. S. died in the same house in which Mr. And Mrs. Fleming had so recently died. Mrs. S. was a member of Brazeau Church, Perry Co., and in the judgment of charity hopefully pious. She left a husband, a numerous family of children, and a large circle of friends to mourn her death. She cheerfully submitted to the will of her heavenly Father, and died in peace, with the comfortable hope that her sins were pardoned; her soul sanctified, and that the night of death would be to her the beginning of an eternal day of peace, joy, and immortal glory.

Departed this life in Cape Girardeau Co., Mo., 14th of May, 1837, Mr. John Stevenson, husband of Elizabeth Stevenson, in the 49th year of his age. He was taken sick the night his wife lay a corpse, and was removed next day to his brother's Mr. James Stevenson, where he died, after an illness of only 6 or 7 days. Mr S. was also a member of Brazeau church, Perry Co. and was regarded by all who knew him as a man in which whose heart the seeds of God's grace had been planted and watered by the renewing, sanctifying, and genial influences of the Holy Spirit. Whilst the tears of the bereaved children still flowed freely for a tender and

affectionate mother, new fountains were opened by the sudden death of the beloved and pious father.

This is indeed an afflictive dispensation of Providence to this bereaved family; but they mourn not as those who have no hope. Mr. S a few hours before he died, put on his spectacles, called for his hymnbook, selected a hymn and requested his mourning friends to sing it. The writer was present when his spirit bade adieu to its clay tenement, and well may it be said of his "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright; for the end of that man is peace." Ps. Xxxvii.37. Mrs. Fleming and Mr. Stevenson were brother and sister. This singular and mysterious providence loudly admonishes all the friends of the deceased, as well as all other, of the mortality of man, and the necessity of being prepared for a deathbed and a dying hour. May the Lord, who sits as a sovereign on his throne, bless, comfort and sustain the bereaved.

IN MEMORY OF MRS. LOUISA DEANE SKETCH OF HER FAMILY

(Jackson Cash-Book – March 24, 1910)

The death of Mrs. Louisa Deane, which occurred on Feb. 26, 1910, after a two-week illness of pneumonia, removes the last of the 18 children born to Anthony B. Penney, by three marriages. First to Jane English, 10 children: Susan, Caroline, Mary, Addie, Robert, William, Thomas B. & Oscar Rodney (two died in infancy); second marriage to Miss Hayden, 4 children: Marie and Louisa, twins, Uril, called "Bud", lived to be 22 years old, one died in infancy; third marriages to Miss Alice V. Dunn, 4 children, and only one, Walter Dunn Penney, lived to be grown.

Aunt "Lou" was born near Gordonville and lived in that vicinity all her life, a period of sixty years, was twice married, first to John Abernathy who was an [first?] cousin of W.W., J.D., and R.P. Taylor, their mothers being sisters. Uncle John died in October, 1875, leaving Aunt "Lou" and two little girls, Alice and Irene. Alice married Henry Volkerding; Irene married G.W. Tisdale. Aunt "Lou" was married the second time to James E. Deane, July 1879. She joined the Baptist Church at Hubble Creek in her 16th year, under the ministry of Rev. John H. Clark, later the Methodist, in which faith she died. She died at the homestead of her daughter, Mrs. G.W. Tisdale, was buried in the Canteberry cemetery Feb. 28th. Services were conducted by Rev. M.T. Haw. She left a husband, two daughters, seven grandchildren and a host of friends to mourn her death.

Our grandfather, A.B. Penney, was born 10 Aug 1801, and two of his children lived a few years in the present century, viz. Aunt "Lou" and the writer's father, O.R. Penney.

In writing a sketch of this family I will trust to family tradition some; also obtaining much valuable matter from an old newspaper containing a sketch of the life of Mrs. Matilda Rodney-Block. Mrs. Block was my father's cousin, her mother and my grandfather, A.B. Penney, being brother and sister.

The founder of the family in this county was Wm. Archibald Penney, a native of Wales. He went first to South Carolina, then middle Tennessee where he married Susan Bledsoe who was a daughter of Col. Anthony Bledsoe. His brother, Isaac Bledsoe, was called by the Indians, "Warring Corn Blade". Both were distinguished leaders of the people and both were killed by the Indians in 1787. [Editor's note: Actually, Col. Bledsoe was killed in 1788, his brother five years later. Source: Durham, Walter T. 1998. Anthony Bledsoe, 1733-1788. Tennessee Encyclopedia of History and Culture. Tennessee Historical Society, Nashville.]

In 1808 our grandfather and family came to Cape Girardeau and stopped at the home of Don Louis Lorimier, commander of the Post, and first settler of Cape Girardeau County. Lorimier and Penney's families at the time consisted of six children each, Lorimier's four sons and two daughters, Penney's three of each. Loromier's wife was an Indian. One historian says she was a Delaware, one a Shawnee, 1808 was also the year of her death, W.A. Penney's children were Pollie, Peggy and Matilda, Anthony B., Isaac, Thomas and William Archibald jr., born in Cape Girardeau County. Our great-grandfather was a gunsmith by trade, but principally followed farming, living on the Rodney farm several years and later on the farm now owned by C.P. Medley, where our great-grandmother died in the early thirties. The oldest daughter, Pollie, married Thomas B. Rodney, an early and prominent citizen of the Cape Girardeau District. He was a widower, his first wife was a daughter of Lorimier named Marie Louise. The daughter, Peggy, married Louis Lorimier jr., a son of Don Louis Lorimier. Her second marriage was to John C. Walker. She outlived them both many years. Matilda married Michael Rodney, a larger planter living in New Madrid County. They were the parents of Mrs. Block who died at the Cape eight years ago, age 86 years. She and her husband lived and celebrated their golden wedding at Cape Girardeau in 1882. They kept the St. Charles Hotel many years. Anthony B., my grandfather, and his wife, Alice, both died in the same house in Jackson, where Dr. Vinyard lives, he on Nov. 13, 1878, age 78, and she, April 4, 1880, aged 47. Isaac was married twice, I believe, had several children, two living, Mrs. Pollie Demortise of Cape Girardeau and Zalma B. Penney of Dunklin County. One son, W.A., died a few years ago, another, John, we believe, was the father of Mrs. Sam Lail. Heard of a daughter, Mrs. Peggy Miller. The youngest, Wm. Archibald, spent much time with the Indians, his brother-in-law, Louis Lorimier, being appointed Indian Agent for the Delaware and Shawnee tribes, then living where Bloomfield now is. Lorimier was appointed by President Madison.

Our great-grandmother was a woman of firmness and very religious. According to tradition, one Saturday evening her son, Isaac, went to a horse race, bet his colt, and lost it. Next morning she was lying on the lounge, reading her bible, when one of the girls came in and said, "Mam, two men are taking off Ike's colt". On her going to the door she saw two men in the act of leading the colt out of the barn. She says, "If you men take that colt outside of them bars, I'll make you smoke for it. Ike is not of age yet". Then went and laid down. The men parlayed a little, slipped the bridle off, put up the bars, and went away.

My father remembered his grandfather well, as he lived at their house after his wife's death, living several years. Said he was a little old man, walked with a cane, sat in the chimney corner, never had much to say, made a pet of father's youngest sister, Addie, who was a baby when her mother died. If any of the other children displeased Addie they had to look out for grandfather's cane. Col. William Neeley, who represented Cape Girardeau District in the State or Territorial government in the early days, and Wm. Archibald Penney sr., were brothers-in-law, marrying sisters. Out great-grandfather opposed the match his daughter, Peggy, made with Lorimier, they having to elope, but, as is always the case, they soon fell in the ranks.

Land at that time must have had little value as tradition says that Don Lorimier once gave 640 acres for a horse, bridle, and saddle. The founders of these two families each have two descendants in Cape Girardeau, namely, Helen Uhl and Joseph Marshall Snider. Joseph Marshall Snider is a descendant of Wm. Archibald Penney sr., being his great-great grandson. The children of J. F. Medley's first wife are also great-grandchildren of W.A. Penney sr. They are W.O. and J.S. Medley of this county, T.A. Medley of Dunklin County, Mrs. Annie Behrens and Mrs. Christine Gherman of DeSoto, Mo., and Mrs. Elodie Snider, deceased, was the youngest.

The founder of the Rodney family was a Hessian soldier named Martin Rodney. In the language of the writer of Mrs. Block's life, these three, once prominent families, that had much to do with the early settlement of Cape Girardeau County, as well as the whole of southeast Missouri, are fast disappearing.

One thing, I think, is well—Lorimier and his family are all buried near each other in the old City Cemetery, Cape Girardeau. The graves are all marked, three of the Penney's children also, viz., Isaac, Peggy and Pollie.

A Cape paper, in giving past events from old files, has this, "Louis Lorimier, grandson of Don Louis Lorimier, died aged 53". The facts are, he was the great-grandson of both Don Louis Lorimier and Wm. Archibald Penney sr. and was named after both—Louis Archibald Lorimier.

Death Claims Mrs. Putz, 85

(Cape Girardeau Southeast Missourian, January 3, 1930)

Jackson. Jan. 3, 1930. Mrs. Josephine Putz 85 years old, one of the oldest residents of Cape Girardeau County died from Paraplysis at the home of her son, county treasurer Henry W. Putz at Pocahontas at 4 a.m. today. She had been in failing health for some time and had been helpless since May 2 when she suffered an attack of paralysis.

Born Jun 1, 1844, at Perneck, Austria, Mrs. Putz spent her early life there. Her maiden name was Reisenbichler. In 1865 she was married in Austria to John Kain and the couple came to the United States in 1866. While on board the immigrant ship on the way to this country, a son Albert Kain was born. He died here 20 years ago. John Kain died in 1868 near Pocahontas.

On Jan. 28, 1869 Mrs. Putz was married to Joseph Putz, who died Oct. 3, 1897. Two sons were born and survive: the county treasurer Henry W. and John G. Putz, the county seat representative of the *Missourian*. A step-son lives at Pocahontas. She also leaves 12 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren. A brother Mathis Reisenbichler resides in Austria.

Finding Maiden Names

The following is reprinted from the Zion Genealogical Society Illuminator, issue of February 2009.

Here are a few things to consider when trying to find a woman ancestor's maiden name. Also look a little deeper for any siblings who may lead you to some of the details.

- A child or grandchild with a middle name that seems more like a surname could be a clue.
- Church records could reveal a maiden name of the mother when her child was baptized or christened
- Birth and death records may have these details
- Obituaries and funeral cards and guest books can be a good source.
- Marriage records may list names of the bride's parents
- Census records could show names of others living in the same household. Look for in-laws.
- Look at ethnic and/or religious newspapers.
- Scrapbooks, letters, wedding guest books, baby books, other home sources could offer clues.
- Military pension records may give a wife's maiden name.
- County history biographies list notable residents.
- Look at wills and/or land records of property, handed down through the family.

[Editor's Note: To which we could add:

- Bible records, provided you can locate them, often list bride's maiden names.
- Court records, particularly petitions to partition estates, can provide heirs of deceased persons.
- Tombstones, although you should be careful not to accept this unless you know about all the woman's marriages!
- Check out the neighbors if their surname differs from the woman's marriage surname. Sometimes these are siblings.
- Diaries, either within the family, or for individuals who lived nearby. These may record marriages that were not registered in public records.]
