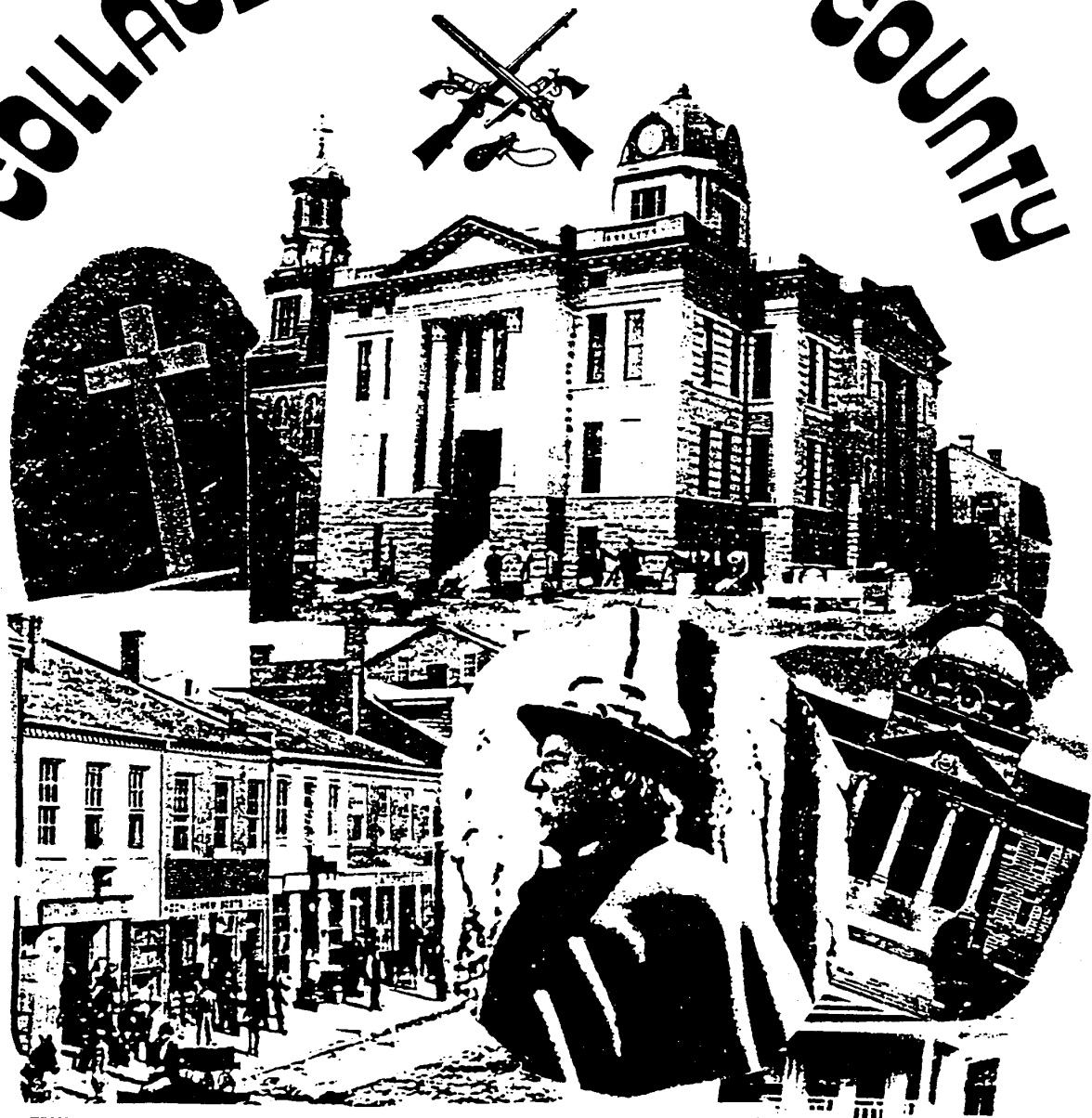

Sam Newcum, the Joker

Betty Rolwing Darnell, 2023

Letters from family members reveal that our great-grandfather, Sam Newcum, was quite the joker. Samuel Milton Newcum, son of Bennett Newcum and Sarah Frances Harris was born 11 December 1856 near Fredericktown in Madison County, Missouri. He married on 16 January 1890 in Mississippi County, Missouri, to Laura Varina Davis Thompson, born 16 September 1866, daughter of Harrison Shelby Thompson and Hannah Adeline Sheppard. After Shelby's early death and Hannah's remarriage to John Harness, Laura and her sister Mattie lived with their older brother Elbert Thompson and his wife Mary Jane "Mollie" Stratton, in Thompson Bend in Mississippi County.

In 1881, Sam had come with a crew hired by Jacob Klopp of Fredericktown, to build the Methodist Church parsonage at Charleston, Missouri. Sam continued to live at Charleston, and was part of a crew hired by Elbert Thompson, Laura's brother, to build a large barn.

My grandmother, Ethel Newcum Rolwing, wrote in a note, about 1973, that the carpenters "had supper at Aunt Mollie's. Mama and Miss Aura Stratton (Aunt Mollie's half-sister) were there. While the carpenters were eating Mama and Miss Aura were looking them over and saying things about their appearance and which they preferred. Mama said she was going to have the one who had a trunk, the others had valises. Well, it turned out that way."

After Laura finished school at Charleston, she attended Dr. Price's Seminary for Young Ladies at Nashville. Sam was continuing his carpentry work for Elbert and others in the area. Letters between Sam and Laura have been preserved by the family.

On 30 November 1888, Sam wrote, "I don't think there will be much Christmas here, I am sure there won't be for me, if you don't come home. Can't you get sick, or find some excuse to get home?"

Sam wrote on 31 January 1889, "Mr. Thompson and myself went down to your place [her mother had passed away in 1886] and killed some of your quails. We were looking at the fence near the barn and he told me he would have a new lot fence built pretty soon and I expect I will be working for you before long. I wish you could be here to tell me how you want it done for I want to be sure that I get it right for I have always heard that old maids were hard to please." (Laura was 22, Sam was 32.) On 26 May, Sam wrote, "The old maid's farm has a pretty good fence around it now."

Sam and Laura were married in 1890 and had four children, Ethel (our grandmother, married Otto Joseph Rolwing of Mississippi County) in 1892, Clyde in 1894, Irene in 1896, and Leta in 1902 (married Bennett Franklin Hunt of Madison County). In 1914, Irene entered the Ursuline Convent at St. Louis. On 15 January 1915, Irene wrote, "Well, Papa, "The Last of Santa" comes in last here again. But we enjoyed that! When I saw the bundle, I recognized your writing, and although I knew something funny was coming, did not know just what to expect. It is very handy to have something to fit in the empty corner of the box. I thought of the turkey foot that used to travel from one stocking to another at Christmas at Grandma's." Our dad explained that Sam, his grandpa, used to send two or three backbones when they killed hogs. The sisters asked, where was the tail? He tied a long curly string on the next one.

Laura passed away in 1942, but I remember visiting Great-Grandpa Newcum at their home in Charleston, Missouri. He sat in a rocking chair near the door, and as we came in, he would playfully stick his cane across the door, as if he would trip us. He passed away at home on 15 October 1948, at age 91.

Mr. GALLINGER, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT.

[To accompany H. R. 6625.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 6625) granting a pension to George B. Stone, have examined the same and report:

The facts in this case appear to be that George B. Stone was a member of Company C, Fifty-sixth Enrolled Missouri Militia, and that while so serving he contracted typhoid-pneumonia, which was followed by total blindness. He was not in the service of the United States, except (see affidavit of G. C. Thilenius, lieutenant-colonel Fifty-sixth Regiment Enrolled Missouri Militia) that on one occasion he was detailed with about 600 other men to go to Ironton and Pilot Knob to assist and take care of sick and wounded soldiers and the military stores at that point. During this service, which lasted a little over a week, he was under the command of a United States officer. As a member of the State militia he has no title for pension in the Bureau, and it has been the policy of this committee not to report favorably bills of that kind; but inasmuch as it seems that he actually did serve, although not enlisted for that purpose, under the command of an officer of the United States, there is some ground for giving the bill favorable consideration. The claim was submitted to the Pension Bureau and rejected December 3, 1885, the reason assigned being, to use the words of the Commissioner of Pensions, "that the organization in which the disability is alleged to be incurred was not in the service of the United States, but remained in the State service. Claims of State militiamen not prosecuted to a successful issue prior to July 4, 1874, are barred under section 4693, Revised Statutes of the United States." He filed a claim July 17, 1890, under the act of June 27, 1890, but that was rejected on the same ground.

Your committee desire to put on record their unalterable opposition to pensioning soldiers who served wholly in State military organizations, and place the allowance in this case simply and solely on the

ground that the soldier was ordered to military duty, and actually performed military duty, under a United States officer. On this ground the bill is reported favorably, with a recommendation that it pass after being amended as follows:

In line 4 strike out the word "upon" and substitute the word "on." and amend the title so it will read: "Granting a pension to George B. Stone."

Evidence in support of pension bill .No. 4408 (hereto attached) of Joseph V. Hobbs, James Brooks, Ex-Lieut. Col. Geo. C. Thilenius, Fifty-sixth. Enrolled Missouri Militia; William M. Hinman, and claimant, Geo. B. Stone, said bill being referred to Committee on Invalid Pensions January f6, 1896.

Joseph V. Hobbs, being sworn, says:

My name is Joseph V. Hobbs; I live in Randal Township, Cape Girardeau County, in the State of Missouri. I am a farmer by occupation; am 51 years old. I have lived in the same neighborhood all my life. I know George B. Stone, and have known him for forty years, and possibly longer. We were members of same company, which was Company H, in Fifty-sixth Enrolled Missouri State Militia, and Stone was transferred from Company C to Company H. Capt. Leemon Hale was captain of Company C. He is dead. Capt. Elisha W. Sheppard was captain of Company H. He is also dead. We were in service at Cape Girardeau and vicinity most of the time. We were detailed to go to Ironton and Pilot Knob in 1864, in October of that year. George B. Stone was along in service at that time. This was during Price's raid in Missouri. We were absent about a week, and were under command of a Federal Army officer in the regular service (United States), but I do not remember his name. Stone was in the Enrolled Missouri Militia for some time. I can't say exactly, but more than three months. We were all disbanded, by the proper officer, I suppose, and were not given any discharges. At the time of the enlistment of Stone, and for many years before, he was a strong and healthy man. When he returned from Ironton and Pilot Knob (and, I believe, when he returned) he was sick—I am not sure—he may have been taken sick immediately after his return. He was taken home, and was sick for three months or more, confined to his bed, or nearly all the time, so I have been informed and believe. He never recovered from this sickness. He was not disbanded before this sickness occurred. This was in 1864, fall and winter. The fever fell into his eyes, and he became totally blind, early in 1865, I think, and is so yet. The fever which resulted in blindness was incurred when in service, and I am satisfied that the fever was incurred in the service under United States command at Pilot Knob and Ironton.

Geo. B. Stone is a man of good reputation, and has been since I have known him. He is old and very poor.

My name is Leo Doyle; I live in the city of Cape Girardeau, Mo.; I am a merchant and farmer; I am fifty-nine years old. I am acquainted with George B. Stone, and have been for thirty years or more. He is a good, honest, fair citizen, and entitled to credence. He has been totally blind for twenty years or more. He is a very poor man and has no means of support.

James Brooks, being sworn, says:

My name is James Brooks; I live in Cape Girardeau County and State of Missouri; have lived here in Randal Township, Cape Girardeau County, all my life; I am 60 years old; I am a farmer. I have known George B. Stone about thirty-five or forty years, or more. We were members of the same company in the Enrolled Missouri Militia, Company H, in Fifty-sixth Regiment, during the year

1864. Capt. Elisha W. Sheppard was captain of Company H. He is now dead. I know that George B. Stone was among the detailed men to go to Pilot Knob and Ironton to repel what is

known as Price's raid. He was gone about a week or a week and a half; I was present when he left with the command. He was in good health at that time—a strong man. In a very few days after his return he was very sick with some fever. I went to see him. He never went back to camp; was sick and couldn't go. He was sick some time during the fall and winter, but was able to walk around, but with impaired vision. He complained during that time of his eyesight—the fever having affected it, fallen into his eyes. Some time afterwards he became totally blind and is so yet. We lived within 2 miles of each other. He was in service when he was taken sick.

George B. Stone is a man of good moral character, and has been since I have known him. He is old and very poor.

George C. Thilenius, being duly sworn, says:

My name is George C. Thilenius; I live in the city of Cape Girardeau, and State of Missouri, and have lived here since 1856; my age is 67 years; my occupation is that of a manufacturer.

I was lieutenant-colonel of the Fifty-sixth Enrolled Missouri Militia, of which regiment Col. William H. McLane was colonel.

In the fall of 1864, during the war, and the time of the rebel General Price's raid into Missouri, Lieutenant-Colonel Hiller, Second Missouri United States Volunteers, who was then in command of the post of Cape Girardeau, acting under orders from St. Louis headquarters, detailed about 600 men to go to Ironton and Pilot Knob, to assist and take care of the sick and wounded of both sides, and take care of the public or military stores. In that detail, under orders of Colonel Hiller, I was in command as lieutenant-colonel of the Fifty-sixth Enrolled Missouri Militia, and took charge, under said orders, of the sick and wounded, and all the guns, cannon, stores, etc., brought them down to this (Cape Girardeau) post, and turned them over to this post. We were absent about a week or over. I ordered 350 wounded rebel soldiers in the hospital at Ironton and Pilot Knob paroled at that time. They were sick and wounded and in the hospital.

I know George B. Stone, for whom a pension is asked by special bill, and have known him for many years. He was one of the detailed men under orders of Colonel Hiller, of the Second Missouri United States Volunteers, in the Pilot Knob-Ironton expedition, and was under orders as above detailed, and present in service during the expedition to above-named points for the purposes named.

Mr. George B. Stone has been totally blind for many years. Ho is a man of good moral character and is very poor and dependent. I have no interest whatever in the claim above referred to.

William M. Hinman, being sworn, says:

I live in Randal Township, Cape Girardeau County, Mo.; I am 76 years of age; my occupation is that of a farmer.

I know George B. Stone, and have known him ever since he was a boy. I know that he was in the Enrolled Missouri Militia; he returned from the militia and was taken sick with some kind of a fever. Dr. Stockton, of the Cape, was his physician; he is now dead. He was sick a considerable time, and became blind gradually, and finally became totally blind. One of his eyes bursted completely. He has never since that time been able to do any manual labor, and since that time has been totally dependent. He was my neighbor, lived about a mile from me, and during his sickness I frequently visited him and sat up with him and contributed to his support, with others. He was sick for some considerable time. He is a man of good moral character, totally blind and dependent. I have no interest in his pension claim.

GEORGE B. STONE.

George B. Stone being sworn, says:

My name is George B. Stone; I am nearly 60 years of age, will be in May next; I reside in Randal Township, Cape Girardeau County, in the State of Missouri, and have lived there since my boyhood. I was a member of Company C Capt. Lemon Haile, of the Fifty-sixth Enrolled Missouri Militia, Col. William H. McLain. I think it was in September or October, 1862, when I enlisted, and afterwards I was transferred to Company H, Capt. Elisha W. Sheppard, of the same regiment. I was one of the detailed men to go to Ironton and Pilot Knob under the orders of the commander of the post at Cape Girardeau; our immediate commander was Lieut. Col. George C. Thilenius, of this city; we were absent about a week or a little longer. In a short time, a few days—two or three days—after my return I was taken sick and got a furlough from Captain Sheppard, and was not able to serve any more. I was sick about three months. I reported to the surgeon, Dr. Patrick Gilroy, who gave me an additional furlough. I was then nearly blind, the typhoid-pneumonia fever having fallen into my eyes and caused me intense suffering. This was in the winter of 1864-65. I went home and never returned to service, the E. M. M. having, as I understood, been disbanded in the meantime. Captain Haile, Captain Sheppard, Dr. Gilroy, surgeon, are all dead. Dr. R. G. Stockton, who was my physician after I got home, is also dead. He told me that it was exposure in service that caused my sickness. I am now and have been totally blind for over thirty-one years (early in 1865). I am totally dependent and have an invalid wife, and am dependent upon the charity of my neighbors and \$5 quarterly from the county.

I have heretofore applied for a pension (I believe, but am not sure, that the number is 531372), but the claim was rejected. It seems that there was another number (492940) prior to above; this last was for claim filed in 1883, in Southern division. These numbers I give herein so that reference may be had to both file papers. Under last claim a further rejection was had.

I ought to say that I never fully recovered my health, though able to try to work about the house and cutting wood, etc.; but not enough to do any good. I was for years after my first illness almost helpless, and was then, as now, supported by neighbors.

These are the main facts, as I now remember them. I do not give precise dates, as I can not remember them, being so long ago, and therefore refer to affidavits filed in applications for a pension in above numbers (531372 and 492940).

I have been advised that a special bill has been introduced by Mr. Mozley, Representative from the Fourteenth Congressional district of Missouri, to have my name placed on the pension roll.
